We assumed that energy costs will continue to rise and that the availability of resources will continue to face pressure in both Canada and the U.S. In determining our expectations for energy costs and resource availability, we primarily considered historical data provided by the Canadian and U.S. governments and their agencies.

Assumptions about the impact of the M&I transaction are based on the additional real estate to be acquired and the increased customer base across greater geographic and business areas in which M&I operates.

Assumptions about emissions reductions and related cost savings of the emissions reduction initiatives were material factors we considered when establishing our expectations of the financial impact of such initiatives. We assumed that the potential emissions reduction and cost savings would be consistent with historical experience and that the results of our energy audits previously conducted will be applicable in respect of these emissions reduction initiatives and reflect the potential emissions reduction and cost savings.

Assumptions about the costs associated with managing climate change risks and the potential change in regulations in respect of such risks are material factors we considered when determining the financial implications relating to such risks. Among the key assumptions were that the introduction of regulations and the costs associated with such introduction would not be material to Bank of Montreal based on our energy costs as a percentage of our operational costs and will result in future cost savings for Bank of Montreal despite the initial capital costs and many of the costs of managing climate change risks have already been considered in our existing business planning across the business areas in Bank of Montreal.

Assumptions about the performance of the Canadian and U.S. economies as well as overall market conditions and their combined effect on Bank of Montreal's business are material factors we consider when determining our strategic priorities, objectives and expectations for our business. In determining our expectations for economic growth, both broadly and in the financial services sector, we primarily consider historical economic data provided by the Canadian and U.S. governments and their agencies.
