

Semi-Annual Management Report of Fund Performance

Management Discussion of Fund Performance

BMO Private Investment Counsel Inc. (“BPIC” or the “Manager”), the manager and portfolio manager, is responsible for the management of the overall business, investments and operations of the BMO Private Portfolios (formerly, the BMO Harris Private Portfolios) and has engaged BMO Asset Management Inc. (“BMO AM Inc.” or the “sub-advisor”) as the sub-advisor of BMO Private Canadian Money Market Portfolio (the “Portfolio”).

Results of Operations

Over the six-month period ended June 30, 2015, the Portfolio returned 0.53%, after expenses. The Portfolio's benchmark is the FTSE TMX Canada 91 Day T-Bill Index, which generated a 0.40% total return over the same six-month period.

During the period, there was heightened geopolitical uncertainty primarily associated with the Greek debt crisis, culminating in that country's default on a payment to the International Monetary Fund, despite a last minute bid to its creditors. Greece is the first developed nation to default on such a loan. In addition, the financial bailout package that began in February 2012 formally expired, leaving Greece without access to emergency financing. Other sources of uncertainty for the world economy during the period included the ongoing crisis in Ukraine and Russia, continuing Iran nuclear negotiations, Puerto Rico's debt struggles and escalating ISIS conflict in the Middle East.

The U.S. economy slowly regained momentum as weather and strike-related disruptions from the first quarter of 2015 receded, and during the second quarter of 2015, its gross domestic product (“GDP”) growth rate was revised higher to reflect better results on exports, consumer spending and residential investment. The U.S. Federal Reserve Board (the “Fed”) appeared cautiously optimistic at the latest Federal Open Market Committee meeting but remained undecided about the timing of its first interest rate increase, indicating it will raise rates when there is further improvement in the labour market and if inflation moves back to its 2.00% objective.

Canada's GDP growth rate unexpectedly declined by 0.1% in April following a 0.2% drop in March, casting doubt on a recovery from the first quarter's severe oil price slump, and renewing fears of a mild recession. The decline was concentrated in goods-producing industries where activity declined by 0.8%, led by continued weakness in mining, oil and gas, utilities, manufacturing and construction. More specifically, Alberta's oil sands were hit by maintenance shutdowns, forest fires and other production delays in April, and the Energy sector as a whole experienced sharply reduced investment in exploration and reduced drilling forecasts.

The Portfolio's longer average term-to-maturity (88 days at the end of the period) contributed to its performance as a result of the potential for another interest rate cut from the Bank of Canada. The

Portfolio's corporate exposure was maintained close to the 70% maximum allowed, as the higher allocation in corporate paper and bonds provided additional yield enhancement compared to government product outright, contributing to the Portfolio's performance. The minimized allocation in the government sector was comprised mostly of provincial and municipal products to take advantage of their higher relative yield opportunities versus Canadian government treasury bills.

The Portfolio's required minimum 30% government exposure detracted from its performance, as corporate debt provides additional yield enhancement vis-à-vis government debt. Other detractors from performance included a lack of holdings in split-rated securities and a lack of exposure to BBB-rated bonds.

Holdings in National Bank of Canada one-year floating rate note were added to the Portfolio during the period for its higher yield over traditional banker's acceptance papers. The Portfolio's existing position in Manulife Financial Corporation (4.08%, 20/08/2015) was increased on the strength of its additional yield over existing corporate bond positions of the same term.

Recent Developments

The sub-advisor believes that the global economy is in a somewhat fragile state and set for a challenging second half of 2015 as several concerns continue to weigh against a stronger and more sustainable rebound. Uncertainty in Greece, for example, and its possible exit from the European Union may delay a Fed interest rate increase, and has the potential to provide a destabilizing financial shock.

Given that the Canadian economy printed a negative GDP in Q2 for the second consecutive quarter (technically, a recession), there will be renewed emphasis on the health of the U.S. economy and the corresponding lift through non-energy exports. The sub-advisor believes that the damage to the Energy sector is likely larger and more sustained than previously believed, and that Canadian economic growth may remain subdued until later in the year. The Bank of Canada announced

another interest rate cut in July 2015. Going forward, the Portfolio's term-to-maturity will be adjusted in a timely manner in response to the sub-advisor's assessment of the economy, while emphasizing high-quality government and corporate holdings to help enhance returns.

Related Party Transactions

BMO Trust Company, an indirect, wholly-owned subsidiary of Bank of Montreal, is the trustee (the "trustee") and BPIC is the manager of the Portfolio. From time to time, BPIC may, on behalf of the Portfolio, enter into transactions or arrangements with or involving other members of BMO Financial Group, or certain other persons or companies that are related or connected to the Portfolio (each, a "related party" and collectively, the "related parties").

Sub-advisor

BPIC has hired BMO AM Inc., a related party, to provide investment advice and make investment decisions for the Portfolio's investment portfolio. BMO AM Inc. receives an investment advisory fee based on assets under management, which is paid monthly. BMO AM Inc. is paid by BPIC.

Wealth Management Fee

Units of the Portfolio are only available through the wealth management service offered by BMO Financial Group. The trustee, a related party, and the Manager receive an annual fee from each investor for the wealth management service offered by BMO Financial Group. A tiered schedule is applied to calculate the annual fee for this service. The fee schedule starts at 1.95% and declines to 0.20% (depending on the nature and size of the investor's investment portfolio), and is calculated as a percentage of the assets under management. The actual wealth management fee payable by each investor is set out in BPIC's *Investment Management Fee Schedule* that has been provided to the investor when the investor enters into an investment management agreement with the trustee and BPIC. The wealth management fee is paid directly by the investor to the trustee and the Manager. The trustee may compensate financial institutions and securities registrants within BMO Financial Group for client referrals to the wealth management service.

Unitholder Services

The Portfolio is provided with certain facilities and services by related parties. BMO AM Inc. is the registrar of the Portfolio. The trustee and BMO AM Inc. are paid by the Portfolio for fees relating to the custodial and administrative services they provide, respectively. Administrative services include fund accounting, record keeping and purchases/redemption order processing.

⁽³⁾ Net assets and distributions are based on the actual number of units outstanding at the relevant time. The increase/decrease from operations is based on the weighted average number of units outstanding over the financial period. This table is not intended to be a reconciliation of beginning to ending net assets per unit.

⁽³⁾ The trading expense ratio represents total commissions and other portfolio transaction costs expressed as an annualized percentage of daily average net asset value during the period. For all the financial periods listed, no commissions or portfolio transaction costs were incurred by the Portfolio. As a result, the trading expense ratio for each of the periods was zero.

⁽⁴⁾ The portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Portfolio's sub-advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Portfolio buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher a portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Portfolio in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a portfolio. The Portfolio turnover ratio is not applicable to money market funds.

Past Performance

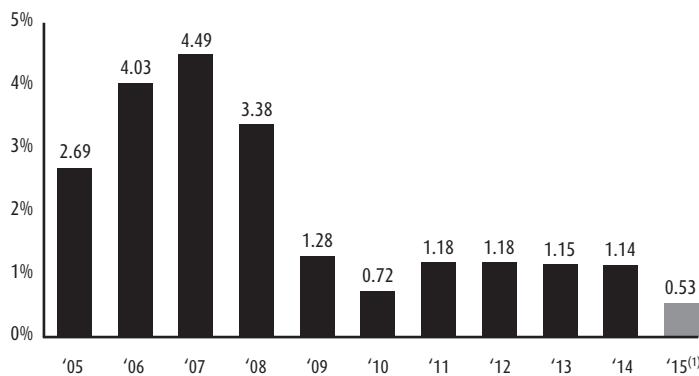
General
