Management Discussion of Fund Performance

BMO Harris Investment Management Inc. ("BHIMI" or the "Manager"), the manager and portfolio manager, is responsible for the management of the overall business, investments and operations of the BMO Harris Private Portfolios and has engaged BMO Asset Management Inc. ("BMO AM Inc." or the "sub-advisor") as the sub-advisor of BMO Harris Canadian Special Growth Portfolio (the "Portfolio").

Results of Operations

For the six-month period ended June 30, 2013, the Portfolio returned 9.71%, after expenses. The Portfolio's benchmark is the BMO Capital Markets Small Cap Index, which generated a -6.49% total return over the same six-month period.

Earlier in the period, optimism about the strength of China's economy and positive developments regarding the eurozone's fiscal issues helped to bolster investor confidence. At that time, U.S. and Canadian equity markets were posting gains. By mid-period, however, Canadian equities began to decline as poor-performing gold and mining stocks weighed on the Materials sector. Gold, which had neared US\$1,700 per ounce at the beginning of the period, fell over 25% during the period, and was trading below US\$1,200 per ounce before recovering slightly near the end of the period. Gold's sharp decent was partly driven by a U.S. Federal Reserve Board (the "Fed") statement regarding a possible slowdown of its quantitative easing measures (such as its bond-buying program), as gold had benefited from the Fed's historic stimulus efforts.

The Portfolio's overweight position in the Information Technology sector and underweight position in the Materials sector contributed to its performance over the period. From an individual securities perspective, contributors to the Portfolio's performance included Element Financial Corporation, AutoCanada Inc., The Descartes Systems Group Inc., Softchoice Corporation and Redknee Inc. Element Financial Corporation and Redknee Inc. benefited from their recent strategic acquisitions, and the value these acquisitions will provide to these companies. AutoCanada Inc. benefited from strong fundamentals in the auto industry, as well as increased confidence in the company's ability to complete acquisitions in the future. Softchoice Corporation was acquired by a private equity firm for a large premium during the period.

The Portfolio's zero weighting in the Consumer Staples sector detracted from its performance over the period. From an individual securities perspective, detractors from the Portfolio's performance included its gold-related holdings, particularly Continental Gold Limited, Argonaut Gold Inc. and Allied Nevada Gold Corp. These companies' valuations declined as sentiment toward the sector became negative and the price of gold dropped dramatically.

During the period, several of the Portfolio's gold- and silver-related positions, such as Allied Nevada Gold Corp., Perseus Mining Limited and First Majestic Silver Corp., were sold as a result of the sub-advisor's outlook for the growth prospects of gold and silver companies in a weaker commodity-price environment. During the

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period, the sub-advisor established positions in a number of companies, including Russel Metals Inc., Halogen Software Inc., ViXS Systems, Inc. and Fiera Capital Corporation, as the sub-advisor was attracted to these companies' ability to grow their businesses, as well as these companies' exposure to North American end-markets that possess what the sub-advisor believes are attractive fundamentals.

Recent Developments

The sub-advisor believes the macroeconomic outlook is dependent on the underlying strength of the U.S. and Canadian economies, both of which exceeded the market's expectations over the period. Monetary policy remains accommodative at this time, however, the market is watching closely for any sign of a change in policy by the world's monetary authorities.

As a result of relative weakness in emerging markets demand, the sub-advisor believes the outlook for commodities has deteriorated. Nevertheless, the sub-advisor believes this environment should be positive for small-capitalization Canadian companies that are focused on growing their businesses.

The Portfolio's mandate continues to be to seek out Canadian-listed, small-capitalization companies with strong management teams, competitive advantages within their industries and that have solid business plans to grow their businesses over time. Given the current outlook, the Portfolio has overweight exposures to sectors that are comprised of more growth-oriented companies with North American end-markets, including those in the Industrials, Consumer Discretionary, Financials and Information Technology sectors. The Portfolio continues to have an underweight exposure to the Materials sector.

Future Accounting Standards

Canadian investment entities will be required to prepare their financial statements in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards ("IFRS"), as issued by the International Accounting Standards Board, for fiscal years beginning on or after January 1,

2014. For reporting periods commencing January 1, 2014, the Portfolio will adopt IFRS as the basis for preparing its financial statements. The Portfolio will report its financial results for the interim period ending June 30, 2014, prepared on an IFRS basis. It will also provide comparative data on an IFRS basis, including an opening balance sheet as at January 1, 2013 (transition date). A summary of the significant standards impacting the Portfolio under IFRS are outlined below.

Based on the Portfolio's analysis to date, the more significant accounting changes that will result from its adoption of IFRS will be in the areas of fair valuation, cash flow presentation, consolidation of investments and classification of net assets representing unitholders' equity. The differences described in the sections that follow are based on Canadian generally accepted accounting principles ("Canadian GAAP") and IFRS that are in effect as of this date. This should not be considered a comprehensive list of the main accounting changes when the Portfolio adopts IFRS.

The framework for fair valuation is set out under IFRS 13 Fair Value Measurement, which includes the requirements for the measurement and disclosure of fair value. If an asset or liability measured at fair value has a bid price and an ask price, the standard requires valuation to be based on a price within the bid-ask spread that is most representative of fair value. The standard allows the use of mid-market pricing or other pricing conventions that are used by market participants as a practical means for fair value measurements within a bid-ask spread. Thus, this standard will impact the net assets per unit for financial statement reporting purposes compared to current standards, and may also result in the elimination of the differences between the net asset per unit and net asset value per unit ("NAVPU") at the financial statement reporting date. The Manager has not identified any changes that will impact NAVPU as a result of the transition to IFRS.

Where the Portfolio holds controlling interest in an investment, it is the Manager's expectation that the Portfolio will qualify as an Investment Entity in accordance with IFRS 10 Consolidated Financial Statements. As such, the Portfolio will not be required to consolidate its investments, but rather to fair value its investments regardless of whether those investments are controlled. If the Portfolio fair values investments

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that it controls, it may be required to make additional financial statement disclosures on its controlled investments in accordance with IFRS 12 Disclosure of Interests in Other Entities. IFRS 12 also requires additional disclosures if the Portfolio is determined to qualify as an investment entity while not possessing all of the typical characteristics of an investment entity.

The criteria contained within IAS 32 Financial Instruments: Presentation may require unitholders' equity to be classified as a liability within the Portfolio's Statement of Net Assets, unless certain conditions are met. The Manager is currently assessing the Portfolio's unitholder structure to confirm classification.

Related Party Transactions

BMO Trust Company, an indirect, wholly-owned subsidiary of Bank of Montreal, is the trustee (the "trustee") and BHIMI is the manager of the Portfolio. From time to time, BHIMI may, on behalf of the Portfolio, enter into transactions or arrangements with or involving other members of BMO Financial Group, or certain other persons or companies that are related or connected to the Portfolio (each, a "related party" and collectively, the "related parties").

Sub-advisor

BHIMI has hired BMO AM Inc., a related party, to provide investment advice and make investment decisions for the Portfolio's investment portfolio. BMO AM Inc. receives an investment advisory fee based on assets under management that is paid monthly. BMO AM Inc. is paid by BHIMI.

Buying and Selling Securities

Related Party Underwritings

During the period, the Manager relied on an approval and standing instruction provided by the Portfolio's Independent Review Committee ("IRC") to enable the Portfolio to invest in a class of equity and/or non-government debt securities of an issuer during the period of distribution of those securities to the public and/or the 60-day period following the distribution period where BMO Nesbitt Burns Inc., an affiliate of the Manager, acted as an underwriter in the distribution (each investment, a "Related Party Transaction"). In accordance with the IRC's approval and standing instruction, in making a decision to cause the Portfolio

to make a Related Party Transaction, the Manager and the sub-advisor of the Portfolio are required to comply with the Manager's written policies and procedures governing the Related Party Transaction and report periodically to the IRC, describing each instance that the Manager and the sub-advisor relied on the approval and standing instruction and their compliance or non-compliance with the governing policies and procedures. The governing policies and procedures are designed to ensure the Related Party Transaction (i) is made free from any influence by an entity related to the Manager or any associate or affiliate of the Manager and without taking into account any consideration relevant to the Manager or any associate or affiliate of the Manager, (ii) represents the business judgement of the Manager or sub-advisor, as the case may be, uninfluenced by considerations other than the best interests of the Portfolio, and (iii) achieves a fair and reasonable result for the Portfolio.

Brokerage Commissions

The Portfolio pays standard brokerage commissions at market rates to BMO Nesbitt Burns Inc., an affiliate of the Manager, for executing a portion of its trades. The brokerage commissions charged to the Portfolio during the period were as follows:

Wealth Management Fee

Units of the Portfolio are only available through the wealth management service offered by BMO Financial Group. The trustee, a related party, receives an annual fee from each investor for the wealth management service offered by BMO Financial Group. A tiered schedule is applied to calculate the annual fee for this service. The fee schedule starts at 1.95% and declines to 0.20% (depending on the nature and size of the investor's investment portfolio), and is calculated as a percentage of the assets under management. The actual wealth management fee payable by each investor is set out in BHIMI's *Investment Management Fee Schedule* that has been provided to the investor when the

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investor enters into an investment management agreement with the trustee and BHIMI. The wealth management fee is paid directly by the investor to the trustee. The trustee may compensate financial institutions and securities registrants within BMO Financial Group for client referrals to the wealth management service.

Unitholder Services

The Portfolio is provided with certain facilities and services by related parties. BMO AM Inc. is the registrar of the Portfolio. The trustee and BMO AM Inc. are paid by the Portfolio for fees relating to the custodial and administrative services they provide, respectively. Administrative services include fund accounting, record keeping and purchases/redemption order processing. The fees charged to the Portfolio during the period were as follows:

⁽⁴⁾ The portfolio turnover rate indicates how actively the Portfolio's sub-advisor manages its portfolio investments. A portfolio turnover rate of 100% is equivalent to the Portfolio buying and selling all of the securities in its portfolio once in the course of the year. The higher a portfolio turnover rate in a year, the greater the trading costs payable by the Portfolio in the year, and the greater the chance of an investor receiving taxable capital gains in the year. There is not necessarily a relationship between a high turnover rate and the performance of a Portfolio.

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Past Performance

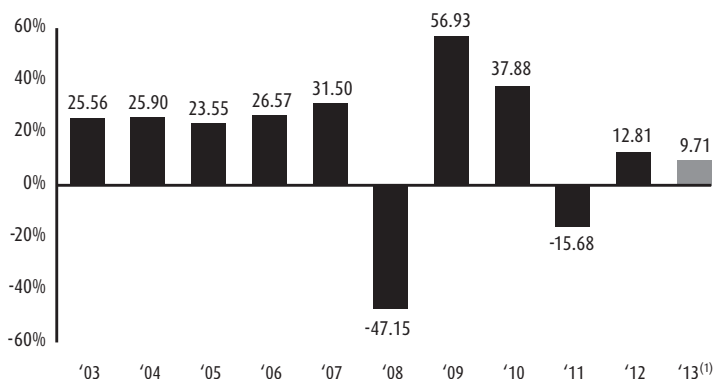
General
